



Can-Sask Career and Employment Services

Q: What is Can-Sask Career and Employment Services?

Can-Sask stands for Canada-Saskatchewan. Can-Sask Career and Employment Services are government services. The staff are a source of career, training, and employment information. Staff at Can-Sask offices help people:

- Develops skills that will help them find jobs
- Plan career paths
- Understand how to upgrade education
- Learn what work skills are in demand

Q: Can anyone use Can-Sask services?

Yes. Can-Sask services are open to anyone who lives in Saskatchewan.

Q: How can Can-Sask help me?

The Can-Sask staff can help you learn where the jobs are and what types of work you want to do. Can-Sask offices:

- Let you use computers and the Internet to help you search for jobs and write résumés
- Offer classes in résumé writing, job search skills, and interview skills
- Have employment counselors who know about Saskatchewan jobs and programs and who can help you plan a career path
- Give you information about the job market, upgrading education, and high-demand jobs
- Offer programs to help you reach your career goals
- In some cases, give referrals to further training

Q: How can I use Can-Sask services?

There are three ways to connect with Can-Sask:

1. Find the [Regional Newcomer Gateway](#) closest to you, which will refer you to a local Can-Sask office.
2. Find a [Can-Sask](#) office near you.
3. Use the internet. We post jobs online at [SaskJobs](#) and we have career planning tools online at [SaskNetwork](#).

Q: Do I have to pay for Can-Sask services?

No. Can-Sask services are free to anyone who lives in Saskatchewan.

Some specific programs are only available to newcomers living in Saskatchewan who meet requirements. The staff at the offices will explain if you are eligible for any programs.

Q: What should I bring when I go to a Can-Sask office?

To help the staff serve you, please bring:

- If you are a permanent resident, your [Permanent Resident card](#), record of landing, or confirmation of permanent residence
- If you are a temporary resident, your [work permit](#), study permit, visitor record, or immigrant visa
- If you have already become a Canadian citizen, your [citizenship card](#)
- Your or other information from an English language assessment if it is applicable
- [Social Insurance Number \(SIN\)](#), if you have one
- A friend or family member to translate if you need help communicating in English

Other helpful papers to bring:

- Your résumé or a list of your previous work, education, and training in English
- Reference letters from past employers translated into English
- Copies of any degrees, certificates, diplomas translated into English

We only need to see copies of any of these documents. You do not need to bring originals.

Q: Will Can-Sask find me a job?

No. Can-Sask provides tools and support for you to look for a job or plan your career. Can-Sask contributes information, assistance, and programs, but they do not find a job for you. Their job is to give you tools and information to help you find a job yourself.

Q: When my visit at Can-Sask is over, what will I leave with?

You will have:

- Better skills for your job search
- Good advice about the job market
- Practical information about jobs, education, and programs that fit your background
- Referrals to other employment counselors, programs, or training, in some cases
